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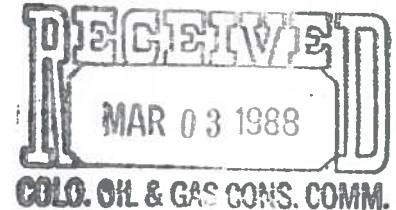

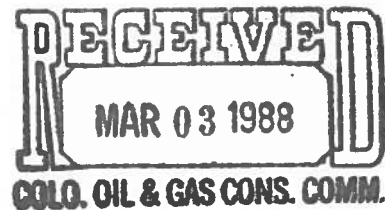

Action Taken to Control the Event, Description of Resultant Damage, Cleanup Procedures and Dates:

The lateral failure at the F. Wilson Well #11 resulted in a loss of approximately 6-8 barrels of condensate. A herd of sheep was in the area at the time of the event, and several animals drank the snow melt that was contaminated with condensate. Subsequently, 35 head of sheep died and the carcasses were buried on location. A representative from the BLM designated a location for the disposal.

The BLM suggested that two small pits be excavated to collect the water, thus preventing the contaminated snow melt from reaching Shell Creek (approximately 1/2 mile away). A vac truck was used to collect the contaminated water, and it was disposed of at the approved Hiawatha disposal well.

On February 10, 1988, the lateral was repaired and returned to service.

On February 14, 1988, the two pits were backfilled and the site was restored to its original condition.
